




Polling Conducted for United Specialists for Patient Access

OCTOBER 2020







KEY FINDINGS

- 1. The vast majority of senior voters say that it is important to have access to doctors and specialists for the patients who need them.
- 2. The vast majority of seniors also have a favorable opinion of physician specialists, as well as hospitals, medical offices, and physical therapy clinics.
- 3. **More than 9 in 10 seniors** say having access to hospitals, medical offices, and physical therapy centers is important for patients who need these facilities.
- **A majority of senior voters are concerned** about the capacity of medical offices, physical therapy centers, and other non-hospital providers to provide care for illnesses other than COVID-19 (69%). Three-quarters are also concerned about the capacity of hospitals to provide essential care for COVID-19 (74%).
- 5. Two-thirds of senior voters (66%) say they would be more likely to vote for candidates who they see as: "working to prevent the proposed Medicare cuts from being implemented."
- 6. Senior voters want action that is beneficial to all types of medical healthcare providers. Based on what they know, three-quarters of senior voters say they support Congress taking action to pass long term reform that would stabilize funding for primary care and medical specialists (76%).



The vast majority of senior voters believe it is important for patients to have access to all of the tested doctors and specialists.


In your opinion, how important is it, if at all, to have access to the following types of doctors and specialists for patients who need them?





And, a majority say they have a favorable opinion of all doctors and specialists tested.


Do you have a favorable or unfavorable view of each of the following types of doctors and specialists?



VIEWS ON MEDICAL PROVIDERS AND FACILITIES

A majority of senior voters have a *strongly favorable* impression of hospitals (70%), medical offices (70%), and physical therapy centers (59%).

Nearly all senior voters say having access to hospitals (98%), medical offices (98%), and physical therapy centers (93%) is important for patients who need these facilities.



Two-thirds of seniors (69%) are concerned about the capacity of medical offices, physical therapy centers, and other non-hospital providers to provide care for illnesses other than COVID-19.


Thinking about the effects of COVID-19, how concerned are you, if at all, about the following?

A bipartisan majority of senior voters say they are concerned about the capacity of hospitals to provide essential care for COVID-19 (Dem. 90%, Rep. 59%).


Thinking about the effects of COVID-19, how concerned are you, if at all, about the following? // The capacity of hospitals to provide essential care for COVID-19



Additionally senior voters of color are 13% more **concerned** than their white counterparts.

A bipartisan majority of senior voters say they are concerned about the capacity of medical offices, physical therapy centers, and other non-hospital providers to care for illnesses other than COVID-19 (Dem. 71%, Rep. 58%).



Two-thirds of senior voters say they would be more likely to vote for candidates who work to prevent the proposed Medicare cuts from being implemented (66%).




